DAILY HEALTH ATTESTATION

Families are responsible for screening their child DAILY at home daily for symptoms.

Regardless of vaccination, staff and students should not come to school if they are experiencing any symptoms associated with COVID-19. Review the <u>symptom flow chart</u> to determine if testing is needed and when you can return to school, or check with your school.

Symptoms include:

- Fever (100.4° F or higher) or chills
- · Cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Sore throat, nasal congestion, or runny nose
- · Recent loss of taste or smell
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- Nausea, vomiting or diarrhea
- Unusual fatigue

Staff and students should not come to school or work if:

- They are unvaccinated and a close contact of someone diagnosed with COVID-19.
- They tested positive within the past ten days or have been told to self-isolate or self-quarantine because of concerns about a COVID-19 infection.

COVID-19 TESTING

It is important to know that anyone can get tested, at no cost, through the Whatcom County Health Dept or by calling at 360-778-6075 OR through the Bellingham airport site at testdirectly.com

Students and staff will need to have improving symptoms and a negative test in order to return to work and school. A molecular PCR test is needed to return to school before 10 days. A home rapid antigen test will not be accepted.

ILLNESS AT SCHOOL

If a student begins to feel unwell during the school day, they will be directed to a designated screening room. There a school nurse or trained staff member will assess their symptoms. Parents will be notified if their child needs to be picked up from school. You can help by talking to your child about telling their teacher, or another adult at school, if they are not feeling well. We'll take great care of them!

We have adopted a districtwide philosophy of "all screening, all the time," where all adults are asked to screen students for symptoms of illness. We use this <u>symptom flow chart</u> to guide next steps for students with symptoms of illness.

It is important that every student have up-to-date contact information and emergency contacts in Skyward. Families can visit our <u>Skylert instructions webpage</u> for instructions on how to update their contact information. If you need support with this, our office staff would love to help you.

NOTIFICATION PROTOCOL FOR CONFIRMED CASES

Here are the steps we follow for confirmed cases of COVID-19.

- 1. We learn of confirmed case through parent/guardian reporting or notification from the health department.
- 2. Our schools each have COVID site safety teams who help initiate contact tracing. If there are <u>close contacts</u> of a confirmed case, we notify them and their families.
- 3. We work closely with the health department on our case response and in providing <u>close contacts</u> with public health information on what to do (e.g. quarantine, testing, date of return, etc.).
- 4. We update the COVID-19 dashboard for transparency with our community.

WEARING MASKS

We follow Washington DOH, OSPI and L&I guidance for masks. **All students and staff are required to wear masks in school.** You might have your child choose an extra mask to put in his/her backpack in case they want to change masks while they are inside the school. Some students may be unable to wear a mask due to medical or other conditions. Our behavior and health teams work with these students, families, and classrooms on an individual basis to support them in safely accessing their education.

Students will be provided masks to wear at school, and are also allowed to wear their own as long as it fits our requirements. Students will need to launder their masks at home. We will also have disposable and reusable masks available in case of forgotten, lost, or soiled masks that need to be changed.

According to <u>Department of Health K12 COVID requirements</u>, a cloth face covering is anything that completely covers the mouth and nose and fits securely on the sides of the face and under the chin. It should be made of two or more layers of tightly woven fabric with ties or straps that go around a person head or behind their ears.

If a student or staff member needs a cloth face covering, we will provide them with one. If a student or staff member needs an accommodation, they should work with their principal or supervisor individually.

Masks are optional when outside. Students can use recess as mask break time. When students re-enter the school building, they will put on their mask.

CLASSROOM SPACES



Classroom space has been designed to allow each student to maintain physical distance and have independent workspace. This may be a different classroom or common space depending on the school building.

ARRIVAL

To ensure the safety of all students and staff, families MUST check their child for symptoms of COVID-19 each day before letting their child get on the school bus or dropping them off at school. Parents may drop off their child(ren) between 7:30am-8:00am. As of September 2021, we are continuing to minimize the number of people to our building in order to mitigate the risk of COVID-19 transmission. This will change as community transmission decreases. School staff will be in front of the building to greet your child and help them go to the playground (if it is before 7:50am) or their classroom (if it is after 7:50am).

Children who arrive after 8:00am will need to stop by the office for a pass to class. This will ensure that they are not marked absent for the day. Our office staff will change their status from absent to late.

ATTENDANCE

If your child will be absent from school or arriving late, please call Wade King Elementary at 360-647-6840 ext. #1 or e-mail our office staff at:

If your child will be picked up early, it is helpful to send a note or email their teacher so we can have him/her ready to leave when you arrive. Please come into the office to sign out your child.

No child shall be removed from any school classroom, building, grounds, or building function except by a parent having legal custody, a legal guardian, or a person designated in writing by the parent. This person may be asked to show ID and a written note from the parent(s) stating it is approved for the student to go home with a designated adult.

We recognize that family travel can be an opportunity for learning. If your child is going to miss school for family travel, his/her absence must be pre-approved by our Assistant Principal, Stephanie Korn. Pre-approval is needed to be sure your child will not miss a significant number of school days during the school year and to be sure that he/she is able to maintain his/her academic growth. AFTER SCHOOL PLAN CHANGES

If your child's go-home plan will be different on a given day, please send a note to school with your child (to give to their teacher) or call the school office no later than 11:30 a.m. Our office staff will pass on the message to your child's classroom teacher. If you email or leave a phone message during the school day, your teacher may not see it until after dismissal.

BREAKFAST AND LUNCH

Again this year, all students are all eligible for a free breakfast and free lunch. This was a change last year in our National School Lunch Program due to COVID-19. We are still encouraging families to fill out the application for free meals using the online form so we can track the needs of our students. K-2 classes will eat breakfast and lunch in the cafeteria. Most 3rd-5th grade classes will eat breakfast outside in our covered play shed or spaced out in their classroom and eat lunch in the cafeteria. Students are spaced at least 6' apart while eating. Our protocols for eating were developed following guidance from the Whatcom County Health Dept to mitigate the risk of COVID-19 transmission.

ALL students will be offered a free school breakfast. Students may also bring a snack from home or choose not to eat during this time. At lunch time, ALL students can have a free school lunch or bring a lunch from home. We are looking forward to having the 'from scratch' meals and fruit and vegetable bar, that we were accustomed too prior to COVID-19, return this year!

If your child has a nut or food allergy, please let your child's teacher AND the office staff know. We work closely with you to ensure your child's safety.

BUILDING SCHEDULE

All students will be dismissed at 12:45pm on Thursdays (beginning September 9th).

Our staff uses this time for collaboration and professional learning.

BUS PASSES

Bus passes can be requested for students who need to ride a different bus or get off at a different bus stop on their regular route. *It is important to know that guest bus passes may not always be available if there isn't room for additional riders.* You may call our school office to find out whether or not a bus pass would be available to your child.

CLOTHING

Clothing worn to school is at the discretion of the family, however, it is important to know that children will be outside, even in the cold and rain. *Inside recesses are only held when the weather is extreme*. Please be sure your child is wearing clothing (or layers) that will ensure their comfort. As the weather gets colder, coats, hats, and gloves are important. If your child is likely to get wet or is uncomfortable in wet clothes, it is helpful to put a change of clothes in his/her backpack. Appropriate footwear is needed for all students during P.E. and recess. Tennis shoes are recommended. *Please label your child's clothing with his/her name!* If your child is in need of clothing, our counselor Mrs. Wakefield can help! DISMISSAL & PICK-UP

Student safety is our primary focus during dismissal. Last year we implement a new pick-up system that makes it easy for you to pick-up your child and maintain physical distancing. A bright green card will be issued with your last name and family pick-up ID number on the front. Please display this in your car window or bring it with you if you are parking and walking to the front of the school to pick up your child. Your number will be entered into our system by staff and your child's teacher will be notified that you are present. At that point, your child will be sent out. If you ever need a new green card, or need extra copies for others who will pick up your child, just ask!

If you are picking up in the <u>pick-up loop</u>, continue pulling forward as far as you can, <u>past</u> the front entrance if it is open. When you near the front of the school, our staff will help your child get into your car. Or you can <u>park</u> your car in the parking lot and walk up to the front of the school to meet your child. *Please do not park and get out of your car in the car pick-up lane*. This slows down the process and creates safety hazards. We will have your child wait to get into your car until you are near the front of the school.

Here are some important things to remember:

- ♦ Leave space between yourself and others while picking up your child.
- ♦ Wear a mask!
- ♦ Always walk on the sidewalk.
- ♦ Yield for the school busses.
- Follow the directions of the parking attendant.
- If you want to get out of your car, please park in the school parking lot or at the fire station lot and walk on the sidewalk to the school.
- Pick up your child on the sidewalk near front entrance to school. Please don't ask children to cross the car pick-up lanes.
- ♦ Please leave pets at home or in your car.

CELEBRATIONS

At Wade King, we value the traditions and celebrations that are important to each family. Our daily classroom meetings give students opportunities to share things that are happening in their own families, and to learn about the families of their classmates. Within our classroom communities, there will be several celebrations of learning during the year. These reading, writing, and unit of inquiry celebrations give students an opportunity to celebrate the learning they have done.

We know birthdays are important to many young children. On your child's birthday, his/her teacher will facilitate special things in their classroom... if your child wants us to. We always take our lead from kids! For the health and safety of all students, families are not able to bring food to share with classmates. If your child wanted to bring something to celebrate his/her birthday, we recommend donating a book of their choice to our their classroom library or our school library. Our librarians have special 'Birthday Donation' stickers to put on the inside cover of the book.

What you won't see are traditional holiday parties or celebrations because they elevate some holidays over others, and at Wade King, we want ALL students and families to feel welcome.

COUNSELING

Our school counselor, Jaymie Wakefield, supports Wade King students and families in many ways. The purpose of our counseling program is to promote a safe and inclusive learning community in which the students become knowledgeable, skilled, compassionate, principled, and action-oriented young people. To accomplish this, our school counseling program provides guidance lessons in classrooms, prevention education, small group learning, and student-centered interventions that help students become their best self within our learning community. 
FAMILY -SCHOOL COLLABORATION

The school closure in the spring of 2020 gave leaders from across our district the opportunity to re-envision many of the things that we 'have always done.' We committed to a system-wide shift from family engagement TO true family-school collaboration. At Wade King, we started the year by making time for ALL families to have a family meeting with their child and their child's teacher. This is an opportunity for your child's teacher to you learn from your family. As this year progresses, you will have more opportunities to collaborate with your child's teacher than you likely experienced prior to COVID-19. *Our staff wants to collaborate with you! Don't hesitate to connect with us!*

HARASSMENT - INTIMIDATION - BULLYING

The physical, social, and emotional safety of Wade King students is incredibly important to our staff. We strive to develop students who have an understanding of what it means to be safe, caring, and principled and to promote a culture of kindness within our school community. In addition to teaching self-awareness, social awareness, responsible decision -making, self-management skills, and relationship skills to all students, our School Counselor, Jaymie Wakefield, also teaches a series of lessons on harassment, intimidation, and bullying to our 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders. Not all unexpected behaviors fall under the description of harassment, intimidation or bullying. However, when these behaviors do occur, they can be especially harmful so we spend time as a learning community talking about preventing, recognizing, and responding appropriately when they do occur. Students and families are encouraged to connect with our School Counselor, Jaymie Wakefield or our Administrative Team, Stephanie Johnson and Stephanie Korn, any time they have questions about potential harassment, intimidation, and/or bullying.

When students are learning at school, they can also use a Reporting Mailbox in the upstairs hallway. Students are encouraged to report bullying and can choose to do so anonymously.



HOME LEARNING

In the fall of 2015, the Wade King staff conducted a comprehensive inquiry into homework. As a result of that process, we shifted away from assigning homework to sharing opportunities for home learning with families. Last year brought a complete shift as we embraced learning from home. As we return to in-person learning, you will see an emphasis on strong teaching and learning while students are at school... and great value placed on the learning and activities students and families choose to do at home. We will not be assigning homework. At the same time, reading together each evening is a habit we home students build their stamina for at home.

HOME LEARNING AND READING AT HOME?

Research tell us that children should be reading at home every day and that is one of the life-long learning habits we want to develop in Wade King students. The time a child spends reading and talking about books at his/her independent reading level matters! Reading regularly is part of a literate life, and provides avenues to endless learning and discovery. Teachers will continue to encourage regular reading outside of school, and teachers will communicate to families what can be expected of readers at different developmental levels. But like skills-based homework, one size does not fit all when it comes to reading. Teachers will communicate options that you can consider as you support your developing readers so that you as parents can determine how best to encourage reading at home. Remember that continuing to read to your child, after he/she is able to read on their own, or giving your child opportunities to listen to audio books, is incredibly beneficial in developing his/her love of reading and knowledge of the world.

Mrs. Hunter, our school librarian, is a great resource if you are looking for books to read aloud as a family, or to engage your child as a reader. Don't hesitate to ask her for suggestions! Her email is <u>Julie.Hunter@bellinghamschools.org</u>.

LOST & FOUND

Please put your child's name in masks, coats, sweatshirts, backpacks, lunchboxes, etc. Articles of clothing or coats found on the school grounds are placed on the 'Lost But Not Yet Found' rack in the first floor hallway. Small "found" items are kept in the office. The school is not responsible for personal property. If your child has lost something, encourage him/her to check this rack for their lost items. Items not claimed in a timely manner will be donated to a local charity.

MASKS

As students return to school, our staff will be teaching them why wearing a mask is important and will help students build their stamina so they are able to wear a mask while inside the school building. Outside is a time that students and staff are able to take a mask break if they choose. The expectation is that ALL staff and students who are medically able to wear masks, wear them while they are in the building. If your child needs a mask, we can provide one! It would be helpful to put an extra mask (labeled with your child's name) in his/her backpack in case your child wants to change masks during the day.

MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

If your child requires staff administered prescription or over-the-counter (OTC) medication during the school day, parents/guardians must return the completed district medication authorization form to school with written authorization and directions from a licensed healthcare provider. Parents may provide written permission for some OTC self-administered medications in consult with the school nurse. Students may self-administer OTC sunscreen with a parent or guardian signed medication authorization form. Medications must be in an original labeled container and only the parent may bring medications to designated school personnel. Please do not send medication to school with your child. Medication authorization forms are available at school or on the Wade King and Bellingham Public Schools website. For further information refer to policy and procedure 3146: Medication at School. PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION (PTA)

SAFETY

Maintaining health and safety of our students, staff, and families continues to be the #1 priority of our school district since the COVID-19 Pandemic started in March of 2020.

In order to keep our Wade King community safe...

- ◆ All staff participate in Health & Safety training and practice Covid Safety Protocols.
- ◆ Staff and students will <u>not</u> come to school if they have potential symptoms of COVID-19.
- ◆ If your child becomes ill during the day, you will be called and will need to pick your child as soon as possible. Students who are feeling sick will **not** be allowed to rest at school for the remainder of the day.
- ALL students and staff will wear masks while inside the school, practice social distancing, and wash their hands often (for at least 20 seconds) to minimize the risk of COVID-19.

SCHOOL MEETINGS

Historically, our whole school community came together on Fridays for a schoolwide morning meeting. Just like the classroom meetings that happen daily in each of our in-person and virtual classrooms, our school meetings are an opportunity to learn and have fun together.

Due to COVID-19, have been unable to come together in person for weekly School Meetings, but do have a virtual School Meeting that classrooms engage with on Fridays.

SEESAW

Communication between home and school is incredibly important to our staff. Seesaw is a platform for our teachers (and your child) to share learning with you and for teachers to send messages to the whole class and/or to individual families. Seesaw also has a message feature that allows families to communicate privately with their child's teacher. All of this can be done using the Seesaw FAMILY app on a mobile device, or by clicking "I'm a family member" at app.seesaw.me in a web browser. If you do not remember your Seesaw FAMILY account password, you can click "Forgot password?" to reset it. SKYLERT

Skylert is a communication service that is used by Bellingham Public Schools to stay in touch with families. This service helps our school district office and school office send announcements, school newsletters and district news via email, phone or text. It is important to keep your contact preferences up to date! You will periodically receive messages from the school district and Wade King Elementary. SCHOOLWIDE BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS

We believe that each of our students has the right to expect the best possible education at Wade King Elementary School. With this right comes the responsibility to respect the rights of others and contribute to a positive learning culture within our school community.

Over the past few years, our entire staff has done a great deal of learning about Positive Discipline through a Seattle based organization, Sound Discipline. That learning guides the work that we do with students all day, every day.

We have school-wide behavior expectations, and involve children in identifying what it means to be safe, principled, and caring in all areas of our school, on buses, and on field trips. These expectations are taught, modeled, and reinforced by our entire staff. We also intentionally teach and develop our students' social skills so that each of them can be their best self. We also use the Caring School Community curriculum to support our teaching of social skills, along with Kelso's Choices and the Zones of Regulation. Daily classroom meetings are a part of every Wade King classroom and problem solving meetings are used to empower students to solve many of the problems that arise.

We know students will do well when they can. When students need reminders to follow school expectations, staff members do so in a positive, consistent manner. When necessary, a student may be separated from the problem, by taking a break in another location in the classroom, another classroom, or in an alternate space. This gives the student an opportunity to regulate his/her emotions and then think through the problem with one of our staff members. When staff or students do or say something that impacts another person in a negative way, we use Restorative Practices to understand the perspective of others and support the individual in making repair to restore relationships. As a staff, we also believe that problem solving is a learning opportunity. If we support your child in solving a significant problem, we will always contact you via phone or email so that we can work together as a team to support your child in learning from his/her mistakes and in making good choices.

The chart on the next page gives you examples of our Wade King Behavior Expectations. During the first weeks of school, students and teachers spend time considering specific ways students can demonstrate that they are safe, principled and caring in various locations and situations.

SKYWARD FAMILY ACCESS

Skyward Family Access is a web-based program that is accessible to families from any Internet connection. With Skyward Family Access, families have the opportunity to:

- Update student and family information
- view attendance records, health and behavior information.
- access state and district test score data.
- access student's academic history (middle and high school only).
- see high school transcripts, graduation requirements and educational milestones (high school only).

The Skyward student information system called Skylert, is connected to School Messenger, the parent notification system we use to send you school news and important emergency alerts via email, text, and phone. You can set up your preferences in Skylert which enables you to receive notification and messages from Bellingham Public Schools and your child's school. You have control over which notifications to receive and how you would like to receive them simply by editing your preferences. Skylert is accessed via Skyward Family Access on the school district website: bellinghamschools.org/skylert. You will find step by step instructions here. TOYS AT SCHOOL

With the support of our PTA, we have many activities for students to engage in during recess and our classrooms have lots of materials for students to use during free choice work times. We ask students to leave their personal toys (or fidgets) at home unless they have made arrangements with their classroom teacher ahead of time and in that case, those items must stay in the classroom.

TRANSPORTATION

Bus transportation is provided by the school district for children who live more than a mile from school or for those who do not have a safe walking route.

You can find your child's <u>bus route information</u> on the Bellingham School District web site. Bus times can fluctuate early in the year so it is wise to periodically check for changes, *If your child expects to ride a different bus or get off the bus at a different stop, a parent must call or send a note to the office. We will give your child a bus pass that he/she can to give the bus driver.

Please note that we are <u>not</u> able to issue bus passes for the first 4 weeks of school or if the bus is full with regular riders.*

VOLUNTEERS

We LOVE volunteers at Wade King! They provide invaluable support in delivering on The Bellingham Promise to empower every child to discover and develop a passion for learning and be ready for the widest range of educational and vocational options. In order to keep our community safe, we will start our year with volunteers outside and move toward eventually having volunteers back in our school building. All volunteers must complete an online application process that includes a background check, verification of COVID-19 vaccination, and completion of our district COVID-19 training. WINTER WEATHER & EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Severe weather or other emergencies may cause changes to the school day. When this happens, schools may need to close, start late or dismiss early. Plan in advance for such emergencies. Please ensure that your contact information is up to date in Skylert so that you receive updates! Go to bellinghamschools.org/skylert and follow the prompts to edit your personal contact information.

We understand that decisions about school schedules and bus route changes have an impact on our families. We appreciate your patience during these situations. While we know that our students and families are best served when we are open, our main concern is the safety of our students and staff.

Typically, decisions regarding schedule changes are made in the early morning before school. This allows for the most current weather information to factor into the decision. This information is communicated immediately, generally before 6 a.m.

WHAT IS THE INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE ORGANIZATION OR IBO?

The International Baccalaureate Organization was founded in Geneva, Switzerland in 1968 as a non-profit educational foundation. Its original purpose was to facilitate the international mobility of students preparing for university by providing schools with a curriculum and diploma recognized by universities around the world. Since then its mission has expanded, and now seeks to provide students of all ages with a truly international education – an education that encourages an understanding and appreciation of other cultures, languages and points of view. IBO today works with more than 4,949 schools in over 151 countries to develop and offer four challenging programs to over 1,250,000 students aged 3-19 years. Within the Bellingham School District, five elementary schools are authorized IB schools (Wade King, Northern Heights, Carl Cozier, Columbia, Alderwood, and Birchwood).

WHAT IS THE IB PRIMARY YEARS PROGRAM OR PYP?

The International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program is designed for students in grades K-5. The curriculum framework provides for the development of the whole child. The PYP is a uniquely international program focusing on the total growth of the developing child, encompassing intellectual, social, physical, emotional, and cultural needs.

The PYP provides a shared curriculum for primary schools throughout the world that includes the district standards as well as state and national standards. The skills for each discipline are directly taught through inquiry. In addition, the PYP provides the students with an international perspective that relates their world in Washington and the U.S. to the larger global community.

Reflection is ongoing within the PYP, both at the organizational level and school level. As part of its ongoing reflection, the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program recently completed a formal study of its program and is in the process of sharing several enhancements with PYP schools worldwide. Wade King staff is beginning to learn about these enhancements and will be implementing them during the next two years. Our staff is excited about these enhancements as they will strengthen our program.

The aim of all IB programs is to develop internationally minded people who, recognizing their common humanity and shared guardianship of the planet help to create a better and more peaceful world.

AGENCY



One of the PYP enhancements that our staff is most excited about, is the emphasis on agency. When students have agency, they have voice, choice, and ownership of learning. They are partnering with their teacher to set learning goals and plan ways to meet their goals. At Wade King we want our learning community to support student agency, with our students to be actively involved in their learning.

APPROACHES TO LEARNING

Our students develop and apply a set of **Approaches to Learning**. These skills are valuable, not only in the units of inquiry, but also for any teaching and learning that goes on within the classroom, and in life outside the school.

The Approaches to Learning are:

Thinking Skills Social Skills Research Skills

Self-Management Skills Communication Skills

As a result, students acquire and learn to apply knowledge, skills, and attitudes to perform well across a spectrum of challenges – from academics to arts and culture, from athletics to citizenship. The results, documented throughout the world are:

- motivated, happy learners,
- students who have learned how to learn,
- learners who can apply critical analysis skills,
- children who take risks to seek deeper understanding of concepts with a global significance, and
- students that are involved in responsible action and social service.
